your rechargeables:
• Recharge batteries when

they are almost fully discharged.
• Never return a fully-charged battery to the charger for an extra boost.

• Never leave your cordless product in the charger when not charging, unless approved by the manufacturer's instructions.

And remember, if it's recharge-

able, it's recyclable!
