

New "Diamonds" Book Is A Girl's Best Friend



Against the glittering backdrop of New York City (with side trips to L.A.), you'll follow the story of Michelle Benamou, a sexy but insecure news producer whose Marine Corps boyfriend wants a career in the Drug Enforcement Agency more than a lifetime of love sealed with an "I do." After he dumps Michelle in search of adventure, she's left hunting for an apartment in the sky-high Manhattan real estate market. With no better prospects, she lands a sublet in a store on chic West Broadway, where she lives illegally while the owner shops for the fall collection in Italy.

Michelle's soft landing is cushioned further when she reconnects with an old flame—Bennett, a lawyer-turned-journalist who has fallen in love with her all over again. Only problem is he's not yet divorced—and she's not ready to give up hope that her Marine will return.

Working at a national news broadcasting station provides some distraction for Michelle, but when the company starts restructuring, her prospects suddenly fade faster than this morning's lipstick.

When the drama is about to go into overdrive, Michelle consults an old fortune-teller who throws stones to predict the future. Before she knows it, Michelle has two men to choose from and a new

dream job reporting on movies in the Big Apple. Better than that, she's learned that a diamond is just a little black rock until it's forged by fire and time—and that the most dazzling and precious gems emerge from life's greatest challenges.
