


Harlem Was His Home

There's a lot for teens to relate to and identify with in this funny, poignant memoir that reads like fiction.

Growing up, Myers was considered a "bad boy." Always an excellent reader, he was hampered by speech and behavioral problems that affected his grades, year after year, until he dropped out of New York City's prestigious Stuyvesant High School.

Eventually, Myers discovered writing and became the awardwinning author of several children's books. Myers is the winner of the 2000 Printz Award for excellence in literature for young adults. He is the author of *Monster*; the Newbery Honor Books, *Scorpions* and *Somewhere in the Darkness*; and *Harlem*.
