6:00 pm: While on your train commute home, you meet a potential date and swap contact information via the infrared port on your Pocket PC and/or their Palm.

11:00 pm: Crawl into bed and breathe a sigh of relief. Picking up from last night's reading, turn on your Pocket PC and read the ebook you purchased last week. Getting ready for tomorrow, set the alarm on your Pocket PC and drift into sleep.
