Food and Drug Administration (FDA) regulations require that prescription and OTC generic drugs have the same active ingredients, strength and dosage form —pill, liquid or injection—as the brand name equivalent, making them equally effective. Brand



name and generic drugs do differ in the fillers or additives used, which are inactive ingredients.

Why are generic drugs less expensive?

Generic drugs are less expensive because their manufacturers do not incur costs for initial research or marketing that brand name drugs incur and pass along to the consumer.

Is it safe to switch from a brand name to a generic drug?

Yes. Because generic and brand name drugs have the same makeup, it is safe to switch to a generic.

How do I find out about available generics?

Your pharmacist is a valuable resource for information regarding generic drugs, especially if you are unsure of what generic alternatives are available or have concerns about switching.
