# Figure Skating Champion And Cancer Survivor Scott Hamilton Launches Chemocare.com

"I want to help new cancer patients recognize common side effects, which can often mask a more serious problem. For example, fatigue is a symptom of anemia, which can be managed through treatment."

Chemocare.com was launched by the Scott Hamilton Cancer Alliance for Research, Education and Survivorship (CARES) Initiative at The Cleveland Clinic Taussig Cancer Center, where Hamilton was treated. The Taussig Cancer Center provides the site's medical content. The site is sponsored by Ortho Biotech Products, L.P., marketer of the anemia drug Procrit® (Epoetin alfa).

Now cancer-free for five years, Hamilton wants to raise awareness of common chemotherapy side effects and to inform and empower his fellow cancer patients to speak to their doctor
