Online Education Creates Worldwide Possibilities

(NAPSA)—In 1964, when Lisa Wright was 10 years old, she attended the World's Fair in New York. While there, she signed up for a pen pal through Parker Pen's computer matching service. Soon after, she connected with a friend in Uganda.

Over the years, Wright came to love her friend on the other side of the world, along with his wife and children. And when her pen pal and his wife passed away due to illness, Wright—now a doctor and married with two sons of her own—did not hesitate to support their orphaned children from afar.

Recognizing that it was difficult for her pen pal's oldest son— Walakira, or "Robert"—to get a job or education, Wright and her husband, James, introduced him to University of Phoenix's online program (James himself has two degrees from the University). As a result of his education, which the Wrights financed, Robert obtained a job working for a telecommunications company in Uganda as an assistant manager and aspires to advance his career in the industry.
