- U.S. Department of Education data shows that students who report consistently high levels of involvement in instrumental music over the middle and high school years show "significantly higher levels of math proficiency by grade 12."
- Students with coursework or experience in music performance and music appreciation scored higher on the SAT than those with no music experience.
- Grade school children who used piano keyboard training and newly designed math software showed a "demonstrable" improvement in math skills.

Educators and parents have joined an initiative called "Support Music," anchored by information available on supportmusic.com. The program is dedicated to positively impacting community resolve and inspiring action to support music education in the U.S. The initiative was recently launched by the Music Education Coalition, an entity created by MENC (the National Association for Music Education) and NAMM (the International Music Products Association).
