MEDICAL VOLUNTEER WITH A COMMITMENT TO CARING

(NAPSA)—Lazy days that stretch 'til sunset...the chance to bring the golf game in under 100...gourmet dinners overlooking water. These are the kind of things that Dr. Jack McConnell had in mind when he retired to the resort community of Hilton Head Island, S.C.

But this vision of carefree golden years quickly faded when he discovered many of the hardworking residents of the island couldn't afford routine medical care.

A long-time advocate for the medically underserved, Dr. McConnell put his retirement on hold, and in 1994 opened the first Volunteers in Medicine (VIM) clinic to provide free health and wellness care to any patient in need.

Today, hundreds of Hilton Head residents come to the VIM clinic, where they receive medical care at no charge from a volunteer staff of retired doctors, nurses and other healthcare professionals. The clinic also houses a complete dental facility, and provides mental health, social work and even chiropractic services.

News of the first VIM clinic's success spread, and Dr. McConnell has been inundated with requests to help start VIM clinics in other communities across the country. He responded—there are now 15 additional clinics nationwide—and the requests continued to pour in for assistance.

Now, thanks to a grant from McNeil Consumer Healthcare, the makers of Tylenol[®] brand products, the VIM model of caring is poised to reach many more people.
