

## **Construction Award Presented To Boston Hospital**

(NAPS)—The Boston Shriners burns hospital has been cited for a prestigious award by the Associated General Contractors (AGC) of America, the oldest and largest construction trade association in the United States.

The 2000 Build America Award was presented to the Barton Malow/Beacon Skanska Joint Venture team, which was responsible for the hospital's construction. This year, 14 top awards were presented in various categories; the Boston Shriners Hospital won for "Building New Construction."

According to information published by the AGC, "What made the Boston hospital unique was the site-upon-site construction allowing for uninterrupted patient care. Development of the new facility began only eight inches above the original hospital's roof. The Barton Malow/Beacon Skanska Joint Venture team constructed a new five-story replacement facility directly on top of the existing four-story hospital, increasing the facility from 80,000 square feet to 200,000 square feet, allowing for improved and expanded treatment facilities. A special erection plan was developed to assure patient safety and comfort was not compromised, and every crane movement was carefully choreographed far in advance.'

The award that the Joint Venture team received is prestigious because of the broad national competition; the judges were also contractors who understand what constitutes a real construction challenge, and the AGC is recognized as an important arbiter of construction standards.

The Build America Awards recognize state-of-the-art advancement in construction, excellence in project management and client service, innovation in construction techniques or materials, community relations and sensitivity to the environment.

Imperial Sir Raoul L. Frevel Sr., Chairman of Shriners Hospitals' Buildings and Equipment Committee, attended the awards ceremony in Seattle and accepted the award on behalf of everyone involved in the construction of the Shriners burns hospital in Boston.

AGC, also known as the voice of the construction industry, was established in 1918 when President Woodrow Wilson was looking for a partner to help the government set high industry standards.
