Being Prepared For Thunder, Lightning Or Rain

(NAPSA)—It can be easier than you think to protect your home. All it takes is a little foresight.

This year the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration predicts seven to nine hurricanes during the coming season, June 1 to November 30. Of those, three to five will be major storms ranked Category 3 or higher on the Saffir-Simpson scale of hurricane strength. To keep your home and family safe, it's important to be prepared.

Here are some things you can do to avoid property damage—or injury:

- Keep on hand a first-aid kit, bottled water, a battery-operated TV or radio (or a hand-cranked radio) and a cellphone. Remember, landline phones can be unsafe during electrical storms.
- You can minimize damage to your home by trimming back dead or weak branches from trees.
- In case you're not home, have an emergency kit on hand for your car. Load a water-resistant container with a flashlight, a portable radio, a first-aid kit, a blanket, booster cables, a fire extinguisher, bottled water, nonperishable high-energy foods, current road maps, spare motor oil and brake and steering fluid, tire sealer, a tire repair kit and tire air pump, emergency flares, a shovel, and a tow strap or rope.

adequately protect your windows. If you don't have shutters, the best way to cover your windows is with a piece of half-inch or 5/8" plywood cut to fit each one. The boards should be marked so you know which piece goes with which window. You should drill holes every 18 inches for screws long before the storm even threatens.

- During a storm, stay as close to the center of your home as possible.
- Use flashlights rather than candles if the power is out. Switch a single light on so you'll know when power has been restored.
