Throw Your Disposer A Bone

(NAPSA)—Food waste disposers are installed in more than half of American homes, and studies show consumers value the convenience and confidence disposers give them in the kitchen. - 2. Don't use your disposer for corn husks, artichokes and other fibrous foods which do not grind well, and can cause drain blockage.
- 3. Do grind peelings from lemons and other citrus fruit to freshen drain smells.

MacNair also says most disposer owners don't know they can usually fix basic problems without calling a plumbing contractor or service agency. The Web site includes a Troubleshooting Guide that tells consumers what

to do first if their disposer jams, drains slowly or doesn't run at all.
