### **Shortcuts For Sprucing Up Your Home**

#### **Water Stains**

Ask your paint store to tint your primer with a color a few shades lighter than your topcoat color. That way, you won't need to use as much topcoat when you paint, which saves both time and money.

- Mix It Up. When you're painting a room that will require more than one gallon of topcoat paint, pour paint from each gallon into your painting tray. Because color can vary slightly from can to can, this ensures the color on your wall is uniform.
- **Go Solo.** If you're in a time pinch, select a topcoat paint such as KILZ Casual Colors, which guarantees one-coat coverage.
- **Do the Math.** A gallon of paint typically covers 300-350 sq. ft. on smooth surfaces and 200-300 sq. ft. on rough surfaces.
