

American Attitudes: How They Compare With Europeans

(NAPSA)—A survey recently conducted in four U.S. and four European cities found some of our attitudes on a variety of lifestyle issues, ranging from love to work to leisure, vary widely with those of Europe. Some of these opinions may surprise you:



The majority of Americans preferred monogamous relationships to "playing the field."

- Money Matters. "The Amstel EnLight Survey" finds Americans overwhelmingly think making money is the most important. Most respondents in London, Amsterdam and Reykjavik consider relaxing to be the most important.
- •Looking For Love. When looking for qualities in a partner, Americans and their European counterparts seem to favor personality over looks.
- Safety First. When asked "If you were trapped in a space station for five years, who would you most want to be stuck with?" Americans are more pragmatic (most chose a doctor) while Europeans chose someone they could have fun with.
- Take this job. While most Americans would immediately quit their job if they inherited millions, some Europeans would have some fun in the sun first.
