Each year, termites infest nearly one million American homes causing more than \$2 billion in damage.



• Put wood in its place. Wood is an avenue into your home for termites. These pests can make their way in through any exposed wood on the ground near your home, so make sure to store all firewood away from the foundation of your home, and set all outdoor wood stairs and posts on concrete.

• Leave termites high and dry. Termites need moisture for survival, so keep your gutters clear, and check that the ground around the house slopes away from the home so water doesn't pool around your foundation.

• Check your spaces. Examine your storage spaces for rotted wood or damage to cardboard boxes. These are signs that termites may have already invaded your home.

• Beware of swarming strangers. Beginning in the spring, reproductive termites swarm near homes in the early evening or after rainstorms. These swarms are another sign that termites could be inflicting damage behind the scenes.

• Trust the professionals.
