Mexican and Native American influence. Shoppers can find a variety of wares: turquoise jewelry, leather goods, hand-blown glass, authentic crafts and more. Nightclubs on either side of the river, as well as El Paso's symphony orchestra, theater, sporting events and hiking trails through Franklin Mountain State Park mean there's always something to do.

In South Texas, wildlife buffs can enjoy the Laguna Atascosa National Wildlife Refuge, with local fauna including ocelots, mountain lions and alligators. In northern Tamaulipas, outdoor enthusiasts can take advantage of the man-made lakes of Presa Falcon, Presa Mante R. Gomez and Sugar Lake. And at Presa Falcon, visitors can stop at the Club Ecologico Novaterra, an educational center where younger generations learn about preserving the country's national resources.
