sage that notifies you the broadcaster is making the program available in HD on the appropriate HD channel-if you subscribe to HD service. If you aren't tuned in to the actual HD channelwhich is usually in the upper tier of channels-it's just plain TV. HD programming is available from all major TV networks including ABC, CBS, NBC, PBS, The CW and Fox, as well as other channels including Discovery HD Theater, HBO, HDNet, Showtime HDTV. and INHD and INHD2.
