

(NAPSA)—While there is no confirmation that Picasso had a wicked backhand, his creative philosophy—to break away from traditional methods—plays well on the tennis court. Proof of this nontraditional approach is a new revolutionary tri-component racket design that has surpassed the one-piece racket design as the top selling tennis racket in the world.



Scoring well with tennis players is a new racket that is made up of three parts, helping it to isolate shock and eliminate up to 60 percent of the vibration onepiece rackets still deliver.

Called the TRIAD 3.0 and designed by Wilson, the racket is made up of three parts—the head, handle and a material that joins the two together called Iso.Zorb. This material isolates shock and eliminates up to 60 percent of the vibration that all one-piece rackets still deliver. The three components are bonded together with an adhesive that holds up to two and a half tons of force and acts as a mechanical locking system.

According to experts, what produces TRIAD's power is Wilson's patented Hammer weighting system, reported to be the number one technology for the past 10 years. The system also affords greater maneuverability and a larger sweet spot.

Few tennis players can find fault with that.
