Growing Your Own Meyer Lemon Tree

Things to know before you grow:

- Meyer lemon trees perform best with full sun—at least eight hours a day—and they can tolerate temperatures as low as 25 degrees.
- They grow best in well-drained soil and generally reach 8-10 feet tall.
- Infrequent, deep waterings are better than frequent, shallow

sprinklings. Deeper watering promotes deeper root growth and helps strengthen your tree. Fertilize regularly.

• Watch out for yellow leaves. That can be a sign of overwatering, under-watering or not enough fertilizing. They're also a warning sign for pests such as aphids, leafhoppers or whiteflies that can damage your Meyer lemon tree.
