The Points of Light Foundation & Volunteer Center National Network has established a family advisory council made up of about six family members representing lost relatives.

All families who lost loved ones as a result of the Sept. 11 attacks are invited to participate by sharing biographical information that will be added to the honoree database, and used to match projects with the names of those lost. To date, there are more than 350 individuals listed in the honoree database.

Anyone interested in creating living memorials through volunteer service can participate in the USA initiative. New, ongoing or already scheduled volunteer projects can qualify as USA projects as long as they are registered no later than March 1, 2003 and completed by National Volunteer Week, April 27 through May 3, 2003.
