Grape Juice And Cancer

(NAPSA)—Purple grape juice fed to laboratory animals led to significant reductions in both mammary tumor mass and the number of tumors per animal, according to a study presented at a scientific conference co-sponsored by Harvard Medical School. The researchers also found that Concord grape color extract inhibited proliferation of rat mammary cancer cells in related cell culture tests.



A new study found purple grapes may have some cancer-fighting effects.

"These studies indicate that components in Concord grape juice can inhibit the growth of certain types of breast cancer cells in rats," explains Keith Singletary, Ph.D., Professor of Nutrition, University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, and lead author of the study.

Singletary adds that while these findings are preliminary and based on animal-model research, they certainly suggest the need to look more closely at the possible benefits they may offer women.
