- 4 cups cubed, seeded watermelon
- 1/2 cup quartered and very thinly sliced sweet onions
- 4 tablespoons chopped fresh basil
- ¹/₄ cup raspberry and/or blueberry vinegar Salt and freshly ground pepper to taste Lettuce leaves

Instructions:

Toss watermelon, onion and basil until well mixed; pour vinegar over watermelon mixture; toss gently to coat. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Serve on lettuce.
